At the recent DQT summer seminar, Sandi Strecker, our teacher, gave a quick hint on how to "erase" mistakes in our painting. She suggested you lick the eraser of a #2 pencil and use that to remove unwanted paint. While I've always been a Q-tip user myself for this little task—much to the dismay of many teachers—I tried Sandi's suggestion and it worked GREAT! Out of curiosity I decided to research how pencils are actually made...General Pencil Company which produces many of the chalk pencils we use in our craft had a very detailed description of this process that I thought was interesting and you may enjoy...

Step #1: Chunks of graphite (a soft, dark mineral) and clay are placed inside a huge rotating drum. Large rocks inside the drum crush the graphite and clay into a fine powder. Water is added and the mixture is blended in the drum for up to three days.

Step #2: A machine squeezes all the water out of the mixture leaving behind a grey sludge. A worker then puts the sludge in a cabinet where it air dries and hardens for four more days.

Step #3: Huge wheels grind the dried sludge into another fine powder and water is blended in again to make a soft paste.

Step #4: The paste is pushed through a metal tube and comes out in the shape of thin rods. The rods are cut into pencil-length pieces, called leads, and sent along a conveyor belt to dry.

Step #5: After drying, the leads are put into an oven headed to 1,800 degrees F. The intense heat makes the leads smooth and hard which makes for good writing/drawing points.

Step #6: In another part of the factory, the wood is prepared. Machines cut blocks of incense cedar wood, a renewable resource, into wide slats. Eight shallow grooves are sawed lengthwise into each slat.

Step #7: A thin coat of glue is applied to the slats and one pencil lead is placed into each of the eight grooves. Within seconds, another wide grooved slat is glued on top sandwiching the leads in the middle.

Step #8: When the glue dries, the slats are fed through a cutting machine. Fast revolving steel blades trim the wood into round or hexagonal shapes, one side at a time.

Step #9: The same machine cuts apart each slat into eight separate pencils.

Step #10: The pencils are sanded and each one receives from five to eight coats of paint. Step #11: A heated metal stamp presses the name of the company and a number—such as #2—on the pencil in foil or paint. The number indicates how hard the pencil lead is. Step #12: A metal band called a ferrule (sound familiar) is wrapped tightly around one end of the pencil. It holds the eraser or "plug" as it's called in the industry. The pencils are then ready to be sharpened, packaged and shipped to the store for purchase by us. Now what about those very important erasers...well today pencil erasers are made from either a synthetic rubber compound blended with pumice or from vinyl. Either way, the raw material is blended to the proper consistency and put into a machine called an "extruder". It is then forced through a small hole producing a long ribbon of eraser. Each ribbon is cut into strands about three-feet in length. If the eraser is made of the synthetic rubber mixture, the strands are placed in a "vulcanizer" which cooks them under pressure to cure the rubber. When cool, the strands are put into a rotary cutter and chopped into bits called plugs. Vinyl eraser strands go straight to the rotary cutter as vinyl does not need to be vulcanized.

Rubber eraser plugs must be tumbled to round-off the edges. The tumbler is a big drum that rotates slowly—and holds 600 pounds of rubber eraser plugs at a time! Vinyl eraser plugs do not need to be tumbled—they're ready to insert right from the cutter.

The eraser plugs are placed into a rotating hopper, which as it turns, lines up the plugs one after another, and sends them down a conveyor line to the machine that will place them in the ferrules on the ends of pencils.

Wow...there you have it. Now the next time you take out that pencil to lick the eraser to remove paint...think about all the work and time that has gone into making this awesome little tool and make sure you say a little quiet thank you to the company that makes it and to Sandi for sharing it!
